

ADI Accreditation Fact Sheet

What is Accreditation?

- Accreditation is a quality assurance process that providers of dementia care training programmes undergo to confirm that they meet the standards and criteria set out by an accrediting body (ADI)
- It is a formal verification that a provider of training programmes meets established quality standards and is competent to deliver training
- A demonstration of competence and reliability
- A type of validation in which training providers and organisations are evaluated

What is ADI Accreditation?

- The purpose of ADI accreditation is to formalise and regulate the delivery of training programmes, recognising a structured approach to training and establish standards that the providers of training programmes would need to adhere to
- The standards for accreditation are set by the ADI accreditation board, whose members include ADI members from across the globe
- In order to earn and sustain ADI accreditation, a provider must align with a set of accreditation standards that focus on management, support for trainees and trainers, programme content, delivery and assessment

Why Seek ADI Accreditation?

- To commit to and maintain standards in dementia care skills training
- A mark of excellence for training providers and trainees
- Internationally recognised
- Further empower Alzheimer associations to promote and offer care and support for people with dementia and their carers
